TOM HONEY EULOGY



Welcome to the celebration of the life of Mr Tom Richard Honey. For those who do not know me I am Jeannette eldest daughter of Margaret and Russell Hartley. It is my absolute honour and privilege today to share with you a little about Tom's life and some of my own memories. I would like to thank you all for being here today and that as I share some of Tom's life story you will recall some of your own memories.

Tom was born on the 16th January 1931 in Elmore and passed away peacefully on the 29th November 2016 at the Rochester Nursing home with my mother by his side. Tom was the third child of Ormond and Clarice Honey, named Thomas Richard after his two grandfathers and was a brother to Dorothy, Cliff and Claude.

While Tom was born in Elmore he lived his entire life on the farm at Diggora West where his family were one of the first settlers first arriving in the area in 1876.

Tom attended Diggora West State school which was a journey by horse or horse and gig five and a half miles each way daily with the horses housed in Wright's paddock behind the school.

Tom completed school until the age of 14. He didn't like school much and had a habit of being a bit cheeky to the

teachers and at his completion of education returned home to work the farm with his parents and siblings. As well as his farm work Tom worked with his father and bothers on contract work sinking dams and channel's with their team of horses and scoop around the district.

Tom's passion on the farm was working with animals. He was a kind and very patient man which gave him good stead with animals, stock, training dogs and horses. In the band of 'Honey' brothers each with their own role, Tom was the stockman, responsible for all sheep and cattle. He had an eye for good stock and a passion for shorthorn cattle. They set up a shorthorn cattle stud named "Tenora" a mixture of Tennyson and Diggora the districts of which they were apart.

The passion and skill for breeding, milking and selling shorthorn cattle saw them as a family travel far and wide showing the cattle and winning many prizes at both local and state shows. He was well known and respected within the shorthorn community for his knowledge, stockman skills and character.



As well as Tom's interest in stock and cattle breeding he was a keen sportsman both at school and beyond. Tennis and badminton were his sports of choice. As an avid tennis player Tom, along with his brother Claude, travelled across the district to play and spent many weekends Hunting was always accompanied by four legged assiswas local tennis after a long working week which involved many early mornings for milking and long days keeping an eye stock and water supply.

Tom had a great passion for hunting and spent many hours pursuing this hobby both on his own, with his brothers and friends or as part of the Diggora West Shooters. Shooting or hunting was always a welcome distraction Tom never took anything for granted and was grateful for even during the working day often when moving sheep, a common comment would be made about a good fox tree here or a great spot for rabbits there.

The sheep chase could be abandoned left to graze for a Tom's mobility and health began to deteriorate and as an while if something to chase were spotted close by or in the crop. Tom's adventures with hunting included some misfortune when he was shot during a spotlighting trip.

I would like to share with you a poem written in October 1971 by Graeme and Fay Haines about the incident. An Ode To Tom Honey:

Now Tom's a young man, around thirty or forty, He's not very tall, you might call him "Shorty", He's stocky, a good bloke though, make no mistake. I'll tell you a story of Tom and his fate.

The air was crisp, and the stars were bright, When the boys went out on the hunt that night, They went in Honey's old battered ute,

Looking for some foxes to shoot.

There was Tom at the wheel, and out on the back, With the guns and the light, were Ted, Rob and Jack. And they took to the roads around Diggora West,

For they knew where the chance of a fox was best.

And soon they saw in the light up ahead,

A foxes eyes, all gleaming and red. Tom drove up the road at a faster rate,

And then slowed down and pulled in the gate,

Then into the paddock, near Appleby's place,

They found the old fox and gave him chase.

Now the fox retreated in hurried flight, And tried to escape that searching light,

Yes, a cunning fox, he'd been shot at before.

And now was his chance to settled the score.

He knew how it felt to have lead in his rump,

So he lead the boys round through a nasty bump. When Tom swung the wheel, the ute gave a jump,

Then from outside came, Crash! Bang! Thump! "Gun overboard", yelled a voice from the back,

And Tom slowed down and stopped in the track.

But as he reached to turn off the key, He looked at his hand and all he could see,

Was his thumb half gone, and with shot in his leg. Darn lucky for Tom that he wasn't dead.

Tom spent many weeks in Melbourne recovering from this misadventure but never complained or dwelt on his own injuries. His reflection of this time and experience was always of the fellow patients and wonderful nurses that he encountered.

CAMPASPE CRIME UP MORE THAN 25 PER CENT UNDER LABOR

Community safety is at risk after Daniel Andrews' failure to do enough to tackle a rising crime rate, Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh said.

The Crime Statistics Agency released its quarterly data today, revealing the number of offences recorded by police in Victoria rose 11.6 per cent in the year to September 30. In Campaspe Shire, crime has risen more than 25 per cent since December 2014.

Mr Walsh said the community was less safe with Daniel Andrews' soft on crime approach.

"The Campaspe community isn't immune to the crime wave sweeping the state under Daniel Andrews," Mr Walsh said. "Daniel Andrews did nothing for two years, as crime rose more than 25 per cent in Campaspe shire.

"It is time for this city-centric Labor Government to listen to country communities that desperately need more police resources to deal with rising crime."

Mr Walsh said any increase in police numbers must spread to communities like Gunbower, where residents now fear for their safety.

Since September 2015 in Campaspe Shire, the number of sexual offences more than doubled from 93 to 230 – an increase of 147 per cent. Offences of stalking, harassment and threatening behaviour rose 42 per cent, while drug use and possession rose 19 per cent.

Shadow Minister for Police Edward O'Donohue said Victoria's justice system was in crisis.

"Victorians are less safe because of Daniel Andrews," Mr O'Donohue said.

"Under Daniel Andrews the justice system is in crisis due to weak sentencing, watered down bail laws, repeal of move on laws, cuts to frontline police and closure of police stations. "These statistics just confirm what every Victorian already knows, that our community has become less safe under Daniel Andrews with home invasions, carjackings, drive-by shootings and gangs such as Apex running amok."

WALSH SUPPORTS NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH FUNDING

An elected Liberals Nationals government will lead the revitalisation of the Neighbourhood Watch program according to Leader of The Nationals and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh.

Mr Walsh said an elected Liberal Nationals government will partner with Neighbourhood Watch and provide \$2m over four years to fund locally based crime prevention initiatives and central head office co-ordination.

"The Liberal Nationals place significant value on this very important community safety initiative which has traditionally been carried out by Neighbourhood Watch volunteers," Mr Walsh said.

"We are right behind them and we will back their efforts all the way."

Mr Walsh said the soft on crime approach of the city centric Labor Government is an unmitigated disaster for rural communities

"Daniel Andrews cuts to police resources and his willingness to allow Neighbourhood Watch to waste away has left communities which were once peaceful and proud now living in fear.

Mr Walsh said the amount of crime currently occurring in rural electorates is totally unacceptable and Neighbourhood

Watch meetings motivated by a strong police presence would be an important first step in curbing the crime.

STAYING SAFE WITH THE HEAT

Hot weather can affect everyone, particularly people aged over 65, babies and young children.

- Plan ahead for hot days and wear light clothing.
- Drink plenty of water regularly to stay hydrated.
- Check that your fan or air conditioner works well—It's a good idea to have serviced before the summer months.
- Stock up on food, water and medicines so you don't have to go out into the heat unless absolutely necessary.
- Store medicines safely at the recommended temperature.
- Make sure food that needs refrigeration is properly stored.
- Look after yourself, and keep in touch with others.
- Keep yourself cool by using wet towels, putting your feet in cool water and taking cooler showers.
- Spend as much time as possible in cool or air conditioned buildings.
- Block out the sun at home during the day by closing curtains and blinds.
- <u>Never</u> leave children, adults or animals in parked vehicles - they can quickly become fatally hot.
- Stay out of the sun during the hottest part of the day.
- Eat smaller meals more often and cold meals such as salads, fruit and yoghurt.
- Avoid strenuous activity like sport, home improvements and gardening.

Signs of heat exhaustion:

- Profuse sweating
- Weakness
- Nausea / Vomiting
- Headache
- Lightheadedness
- Muscle cramps



Heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke. Body temp of 40 degrees or high, is the main sign of heat stroke. The skin may be dry. Other symptoms may include confusion, slurred speech, agitation, rapid breathing, racing heart rate, and flushed skin. Seek medical help if you think you are experiencing heat stroke.

The symptoms of heat stroke may be the same as for heat exhaustion, but the skin may be dry with no sweating and the person's mental condition worsens.
